

Toothed whales. Both the species are disappearing at an alarming rate but Blue Whales; the largest creatures in the animal and human world are disappearing extremely quickly. At approximately 30 metres in length and 170 tons or more in weight, it is the largest known animal to have ever existed. There were about 235,000 whales in this world before the hunting began. In 1964 a mind-boggling survey showed only about 650-2000 blues whales were left. Then the governments of the world started to protect these magnificent beings. A 30 years later survey showed there are less than 5000 whales in the world. This was an increase but we still have a long way to reach the old numbers, 2100-3100.

The Passenger Pigeon or Wild Pigeon is an extinct North American bird. Some estimate 3 to 5 billion Passenger Pigeons were in the United States when Europeans arrived in North America. The species lived in enormous migratory flocks until the early 20th century, when hunting and habitat destruction led to its demise.

The main diet of the passenger pigeon included acorns, chestnuts, seeds and berries found in the forests. Worms and insects supplemented the diet in spring and summer. Prior to colonization, Americans occasionally used pigeons for meat. In the early 19th century, commercial hunters began netting and shooting the birds to sell in city markets as food.

Once pigeon meat became popular, commercial hunting started on an enormous scale. NEHARATHI

The degradation of forest land due to continuous human activity is termed as desertification. Desertification leads to droughts which results in water and food scarcity. Plant roots hold the soil together, preventing erosion. Many organisms live and depend on trees, and by destroying trees, species can die, which can indirectly or directly affect other species as well. AMÉRCIA LATINA PROPONE IDEAS PARA LOS OBJETIVOS DE DESARROLLO DESPUÉS DEL 2015

Del 7 al 9 de marzo participé en el Congreso Latinoamericano sobre el Desarrollo Sostenible en América Latina y el Caribe: seguimiento a la Agenda Post-2015 y Río+20 que tuvo lugar en Bogotá, capital de Colombia. Allí se reunieron a puertas cerradas varios ministros y delegados presidenciales, los cuales presentaban la postura y sugerencias de su país frente a los nuevos objetivos que deben fijarse después del año 2015 cuando culmina el plazo de cumplimiento para los Objetivos de Desarrollo del Milenio.

Para comenzar debemos acordarnos que en el año 2000 se reunieron en Nueva York, en el marco de la Cumbre del Milenio, representantes de los 189 países que hacen parte de la ONU los cuales acordaron conseguir para el año 2015 ocho propósitos de desarrollo humano, por primera vez se proponía una fecha para lograr acuerdos concretos y medibles en la agenda internacional del desarrollo.

Los ocho objetivos son: erradicar la pobreza extrema y el hambre; lograr la enseñanza primaria universal; promover la igualdad entre los géneros y la autonomía de la mujer; reducir la mortalidad infantil; mejorar la salud materna; combatir el VIH/SIDA, el paludismo y otras enfermedades; garantizar el sustento del medio ambiente y por último encontramos fomentar una asociación mundial para el desarrollo.

En respuesta a lo anterior, el Secretario General de la ONU, conformó el Panel de Alto Nivel para la Agenda Post-2015, del cual hacen parte 27 países de todo el mundo y es encabezado por el Presidente Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono de Indonesia; la Presidenta Ellen Johnson Sirleaf de Liberia; y el Primer Ministro David Cameron del Reino Unido. El objetivo de este panel es consultar con todos las partes interesadas y acordar una hoja de ruta que ayuden en las deliberaciones sobre la agenda de desarrollo posterior a 2015.

Del Panel de Alto Nivel para la Agenda Post-2015, únicamente hacen parte cuatro países de América Latina que son, Brasil, Cuba, México y Colombia, los cuales deben representar a todos los demás.

Por este motivo se realizó en Bogotá esta conferencia de la cual participaron Amina Mohammed, Asesora Especial del Secretario General para la Agenda Post-2015; María Ángela Holguín, Canciller de Colombia; Gisela Alonso, Canciller de Cuba; Patricia Espinosa, Ex canciller de México; Heraldo Muñoz, Presidente del PNUD para América Latina, entre otros representantes de los países del continente.

En Bogotá se deseaba escuchar a los demás países latinoamericanos quienes no hacen parte del Panel de Alto Nivel, sus propuestas y su postura para la agenda de desarrollo mundial después de 2015, además se debatió la integración de los Objetivos de Desarrollo Sostenible (ODS), el acuerdo más importante de Río+20, con la Agenda Post-2015. La mayoría de países se encontraron en la importancia de que los dos sean uno solo, mientras que Brasil, señalaba la importancia de tener a ambos separados.

Entre los debates se mencionó la importancia de disminuir la brecha de desigualdad, tanto entre personas como entre países; sacar a América Latina de la pobreza, siempre tener el bienestar del hombre como punto central; continuar trabajando por la igualdad de género, invertir en la educación y el empleo, además de darle protagonismo a la juventud mundial la cual vive una gran crisis.

- Se hizo énfasis en la necesidad de que toda América Latina se integre con la tecnología, además de plantear una nueva arquitectura de desarrollo, trabajar fuertemente con la Declaración de Río`92 y Río+20. Respetar, apoyar y defender los derechos de la comunidad LGTBI y se recalcó la importancia de no capitalizar la naturaleza.

ARTICLE BY MADHAV DUTT – FOUNDER "GREEN THE GENE"

Green the Gene's youth members from Faridabad came up with this innovative method of recycling the plastic bottles and the chaff-husk boards to make the park benches. Our goal is to save the tonnes of metal used to make the general park benches. By this project a large amount of waste plastic bottles are brought under use and are not burned or dumped in the soil, which is a major contributor to the increasing soil and air pollution levels. Our main target is to enhance the socio-environmental factor by letting the underprivileged children volunteer for this initiative. Our project is about recycling the waste plastic bottles and polybags used by people in our city, by using the concept of the 3 R's which is Reuse, Reduce, and Recycle. We are trying to use this waste to the best extent, by segregating it, making chairs and benches for people in public parks and gardens. Reused Polybags are also recycled. This waste, earlier used to litter, choke drains or were burnt, but now they do not pollute the environment . This project was started by us in 2010, in Faridabad, and we have been working on it ever since. The desired situation is which would make our project successful, is when people are very much aware about the situation and are responsible as well as willing to change for a cause. We want that with the help of our initiative the society is benefited on a large scale. The waste bottles are properly made up into benches, and recycled and reduced to the least possible amount. Our localities and the area surrounding are now almost free from litter plastic bottles. The basic problem which is being solved is the proper usage of what we already have. It is one of the basic steps towards the bigger picture! It even beautifies the park or garden where the bench has been placed. This project requires less amount of resources but a moderate amount of manpower. The making includes children participating in large numbers, bringing in unprivileged children as well which leads to development of backward parts of the society. It therefore, has a greater impact on the local area.

This is a very easy to make project and can be completely built up without any professionals in less than 30 minutes.

Before we started the project, all the waste plastic bottles and were together dumped at a dumping space, which degraded the soil of that area and occupy landfill space. Due to this, we saw the need for this project. We started this project in sector Faridabad, Haryana, where now waste instead of being burnt or dumped in landfill spaces or in the local canal, choking it with plastic and waste. This used to, earlier lead to pollution of all forms. To verify need for the project, we visited the office of the Municipal Corporation Faridabad to use their surveys, information etc. to confirm the need of this project. We also consulted the Municipal Corporation Officers for the validation of the ideas and processes put to use by us in our project, while also the requirement of this project in our communities. Support came from the Municipal Corporation Faridabad.

The Green the gene team worked for the plan of actions. We are trying to get these benches all over the city so that there is less wastage of the resources and waste can be reused. By this project a large amount of waste plastic bottles are brought under use and are not burned or dumped in the soil, which is a major contributor to the increasing soil and air pollution levels. Our main target is to enhance the socio-environmental factor by letting the underprivileged children volunteer for this initiative. We are successfully now able to make park / garden benches using 133 waste plastic bottles (common 2L variants) along with hay chaff boards for support, these save about 70-80 kg of metal (usually iron) that is used in a conventional bench. We have been able to replicate this idea and benches over the city and aspire to take it further with assistance of the corporates and the Central Public Works Department to all over the state. This project has multi-faceted impacts, it not only improves and involves local waste recyclers and collectors but also puts plastic bottles (usually never recycled in India) to good use, along with saving metal for other purposes.




GRIEIEN HOPE WAIE @ IEARWH HOWR


